**DESCRIPTION:** This table topper is meant to teach you how to cut fabric using the degree lines on your long 6" x 24" ruler. If you happen to have one or can borrow a 60 degree ruler, you can use that but please do not feel you need to go out and buy one!!

#### **SUPPLIES:**

- Choose 5 different fabrics that coordinate. They might be all holiday fabric - Christmas, Halloween, etc. or fabrics left over from a jelly roll or just a group of fabrics that you like. Mix up lights, darks, and mediums for visual interest. **Please cut your fabric strips before coming to class.**
  - (5) 2-1/2" strips x WOF - one strip from each of your 5 fabrics.
  - (2) 2-1/2" strips x WOF for the binding – can be the same as one of your 5 strips or a contrasting fabric.
- **Backing – coordinating piece of fabric at least 25" square.**
- **Batting – cut a bit larger than 25" square –** can be cotton, polyester or a combination, not too puffy.
- **Coordinating thread –** save time by filling a bobbin with this thread.
- **Long quilting ruler with 60 degree lines marked on the ruler.** Most rulers will also have 30 and 45 degrees marked as well as 60 degrees. Could be 6, 6 ½, 8, or 8 ½ inches wide by 24 inches long. If you have a 60 degree specialty ruler, please bring it but do not feel you have to go out and buy one!
- Usual sewing notions – Rotary cutter, cutting mat, scissors, pins, seam ripper, etc.
- Sewing machine in good working order fitted with a ¼" foot. **Optional:** Bring a walking foot if you have one or a darning foot if you like to do free motion quilting. If you have neither quilting foot, the table topper is small enough that you should be able to quilt it using your ¼" foot.

**Please note: We will not have time to deal with a sewing machine that does not work properly so make sure you know how to use yours and that it is making a good straight stitch. This will save you a lot of frustration!!**
